Overview

FamilySearch offers some of the most powerful tools for exploring your family history. In this handout and video, we will dive into some of my favorite features that will elevate your research to the next level.

Tree View & Filters

Briefly About the Tree

In the tree view, there are a few key features to highlight. To access the tree, click on Family Tree and then select the Tree tab. From there, you can filter the view to your preference. The Fan Chart, Landscape, and Portrait views offer the ancestral view. The descendancy view allows for viewing the descendants of a selected person. All



these views use the 'home person' as the starting point for constructing the tree. You will have different filters available depending on which tree view you are using.



Hover over a person in the Fan view to see a mini fan. Click on the mini fan to move them to the center of the fan tree.

Filters

In the upper right corner, you will find a slider that allows you to adjust the filters for the tree view you are currently using.



Fan View & Filters

While there are several filters to explore, here are a couple of particularly helpful ones you can use in the fan view. Start by setting your tree view to the fan view.





Birthplace


Clicking on the birthplace filter will colorize the tree to indicate which branches originate from various parts of the world, with a legend displayed on the left side for reference (as shown below).



Research Helps


Research Helps is one of the most valuable features in the FamilySearch tree. It highlights data issues, record hints, and research suggestions. The tree will be colorized with a legend on the left side for your reference. Using this filter can help you **maintain an accurate family history**.

Keep in mind that the FamilySearch Family Tree is a vast, **collaborative global tree**, and **new records are added every day**. As a result, the information is frequently updated. **Check the Research Helps filter regularly** to ensure your tree is current and free of errors. Additionally, you can expand the fan view to show up to seven generations.



Landscape & Portrait Tree Views

Switching to the landscape or portrait tree views and applying the filters provides additional information about potential errors, research, and record hints. You can toggle the features on and off to display what you want to see in your tree. Pay attention to the icons that indicate record hints, research suggestions, and data problems. Look closely at these icons next to each hint to explore them further.




Finding People

Simple Search


There are several ways to search for an individual:

- Clicking on the FamilySearch logo in the upper left corner of the website takes you to a page with a search for an ancestor window on the right-hand side.
- From anywhere on the platform, you can click on the search button and choose records for a search window. For more accurate results, it is helpful to click on "more options" and provide additional family information.



Person ID

Each person in the FamilySearch tree has a unique ID number, which can be found at the end of the URL for their profile and under their name in the profile view.



To copy this ID number,

hover over and click on it in the profile. Then, add it to your research notes to easily locate the person again by searching for the ID.

Additionally, it is helpful to **include the ID number in your Ancestry.com ancestor profile** by using the "**Add a Web Link**" feature in the **Sources column** of the Ancestry profile view.


Search by ID

Go to **Search**, then **Family Tree**. You then can search by **name** or **Find by ID**.



Profile Tips

The **About** tab provides a quick overview of your ancestor and is a good place to include stories and photographs you may want to share.



The **Details** tab is divided into two columns. The left column displays all the details already added to the ancestor's profile, while the right column is useful for starting additional research. We will focus on a couple of features in the right-hand column that are often overlooked.




Research Help

The research help widget on the right-hand side of the profile view is particularly useful for alerting you to problems and provides explanations for these issues.


Notes

Another area in the Profile view (right-side column) is the **Notes** section, where other researchers collaborate on information about the ancestor. This section contains hypotheses and thoughts from fellow genealogists. Drill in to see who left the notes. You can then click on their username to reach out to them if needed.



Sources Tab

The **Sources tab is likely the most important tab in the ancestor profile** and is the first place I go when researching. It shows what sources have already been attached to the person and highlights any missing information. Click the down arrow (on the right side of each source) to see more details for each individual source. If possible, **drill into the actual record** and view the image.



Collaborate


Whenever you have questions about certain records that a person has attached to your ancestors profile. I highly recommend you reach out to the collaborators as they are likely your cousins. Click the Collaborate tab to see who has left notes.

Memories

The Memories tab is an excellent place to upload records or images that you want to share. Keep in mind that anything you upload on the FamilySearch platform is available to everyone.


Timeline

The timeline is one of my new favorite features. It provides a glimpse of your ancestor's timeline in the left-hand column and offers a map with their locations. Click **"Show Route"** (in the lower left of the map) to animate your ancestor's travel path throughout their lifetime. Use Control + the wheel on your mouse to zoom in and out.



Activities - Where Am I From?

There are many features to explore in the Activities tab at the top of the web page. In the **Activities** tab, go to the "**Where Am I From**" submenu and click on **Timeline**. Here, you can see the locations of your ancestors around the world and zoom in for a closer look. Pay attention to the date sliding bar filter at the bottom of the screen, which allows you to filter to a specific date range.




Activities – Famous Relatives


Here you can find how you *might* be related to famous people. Click on the **Activities tab** and drop down to **Famous Relatives**.

My mother would have been thrilled to know she might have descended from George Washington, our first President of the United States. Just remember, you need to verify every ancestral link with records.

To Do List



The To Do List is a feature that I was not even aware of until just recently. Clicking on the FamilySearch icon in the upper left corner will bring you back to the home screen. From there Scroll down on the right hand side and you will see a mini widget that says To Do List.


Here you can keep track of items that you would like to do. I highly recommend that you add a URL hyperlink to the To Do List so that you know which ancestor and where you need to go next. Items can be checked off as you complete them.

Bonus Tip - Finding How Any Two People Are Related


In this bonus tip, I will show you how to find a *possible* path between any two people as long as they are both in the FamilySearch tree. Remember, you need to verify these connections with records before you can prove the connection.

In this case, I wanted to see **if Daniel Boone** (famous frontiersman) **was related to James Madison, Jr.** (U.S. President).


- In order to do this trick to work, you will need to get the ID number for both people on FamilySearch before moving on to the next step. Search for and go to their profiles and get the ID numbers. Here I've found:
 - a. James Madison is ID LZTD-MFS
 - b. Daniel Boone is ID LBMJ-QRX
- 2) In a new browser tab go to https://relativefinder.org/ and login with your FamilySearch username and password.
- 3) Click on the **Connect** tab at the top of the screen.
- 4) Choose the appropriate radio button. In this case I wanted to see if Daniel Boone was related to James Madison, so I chose the second button "See the relationship between two deceased people."



Connect Two Deceased



The results show they are supposedly 5th cousins, once removed. Again, verify your connections with records for proof! Click on the name under Relative to see the path to the common ancestor.



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
